

Small-town Space and Society: Documents Illustrative of Loughborough in the Eighteenth Century

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INTRODUCTION

The ambition of this work is limited: to provide a selection of documents from various sources which are illustrative of the spatial and social development of Loughborough in the eighteenth century. Belonging to the category of small towns, Loughborough cannot stand, however, for all those small urban places because, although they had some common features, they also all possessed different characteristics, often reflecting their earlier organization.¹ The documents are presented without extensive analysis. The emphasis is on people and space.

The chronology of the documents is not just based on the calendrical year nor is it associated with notions of the 'long eighteenth century'. The parameters are c.1700 to c.1808 because of circumstances internal to the nature of landownership in the town and parish. The commencement at c.1700 is justified by the changes in relationships of landholding on the Hastings manor of Loughborough which dominated the town. Most of the holdings, including those in the urban precinct, had been held by copyhold for three lives from the lord, the Hastings family. From the fourth decade of the seventeenth century and more particularly from the 1650s, the copyholds were converted to leaseholds. Lives remaining in the copyhold were, nevertheless, respected, so that copyhold was not superseded completely by leasehold until closer to the end of the century. From c.1808, the Earl of Moira, the representative of the Hastings lordship, began to relinquish an interest in Loughborough, resulting in the disintegration of his estate through several sales.² It has been suggested that Loughborough eclipsed other towns in Leicestershire even more rapidly after its connection to the improved Soar navigation from 1777.³ The extension of the selected documents to c.1808 allows a perspective on that impact.

The principal sources can be briefly listed: the Hastings Manuscripts in the Huntington Library in San Marino, California (purchased from Maggs Bros in January 1927 who had acquired the archive from Edith Maud Hastings, Countess of Loudon); the probate material in the National Archives, London, and in the Record Office for Leicestershire, Leicester and Rutland; the parish registers in the last institution (ROLLR); records of the Sun Fire office in the London Archives; newspapers; and the *London Gazette*. A decision had to be made about what to include and exclude. The material from the Hastings Manuscripts is a selection; in particular, only illustrative or sample court rolls (manorial court and view of frankpledge, the latter a privileged jurisdiction) are introduced. There are numerous court rolls, for almost every year, at the Huntington. The selection here represents the early eighteenth century (one item) and the end of the century (two rolls). It was decided also to exclude the records of the Bridgemasters' Trust, despite the level of its income, and the churchwardens, since their respective purposes were different from the focus on space and people in place.⁴

The governance of Loughborough was diffuse, but still mainly through the manor court and view of frankpledge. Unlike some other small urban places, the inhabitants did not petition for an Improvement Commission.⁵ It was not until 1850 that a co-ordinating unitary authority was established in the Local Board of Health.

The 'Lists of Inhabitants' are something of a conundrum. They seem to combine the list of adult persons in the town with the purpose of whether they owed suit of court. For those who did owe suit, there is notation 'e' or 'a' as to whether they essoined (made excuse) or attended. Where there is no note it might

be that the 'inhabitant' did not owe suit. The listings also designate the officers: jurors (J); street masters under the general street master; and the constable. In the case of those designated 'poor', the position is probably that they were excused any fine for non-suit. The list of 1778 is extremely complicated. Both lists contain amendments in a second column. In these additions, the ink is consistently darker than in column one. These inscriptions are evidently later changes and additions. The alterations and additions are especially frequent in the list of 1778 in Woodgate which thus appears to be an area of the town expanding outwards and with frequent turnover of occupancy.⁶ For some of the eighteenth century, the court assembled in the 'Court Chamber' in the Market Place, which also functioned occasionally as a ball-room and theatre.⁷

Associated with the court are the byelaws for the regulation of husbandry and the environment of the town through the prosecution of nuisances. Since the 'open fields' of Loughborough were enclosed in 1762, byelaws are reproduced here from before and after that date.⁸

The Land Tax assessment divulges much about urban space. The 'structure' of landholding is extremely complex, with a considerable amount of leasing or under-leasing by townspeople other than the Earl of Huntingdon. Townspeople leased to each other to consolidate their land. There is also an interesting insight into the housing. Houses were rated from 2½d (presumably cottages), through 5d, 7½d, and to a maximum of 10d., in four standard categories of building. There are, however, houses with land tax assessments over 10d which were obviously elite housing. The listings and the Land Tax reveal how infilling was undertaken on plots so that streets contained an intermixture of large, medium and small (cottage) housing.

The elite housing is further illustrated by advertisements in the local newspaper. Only the *Leicester Journal* existed in the county at this time. Notices about houses for sale or lease concerned mostly the higher level of housing, much of which consisted of new builds. Although selective, these insertions in the paper provide information about some new building in the central precinct of the town in the late eighteenth century.

There is one instance of a row of new houses, constructed as Savage's Row (Sparrow Hill) (No. 73; still know by this name later: No. 120). The constructor of this housing was probably Edward Savage II, carpenter, of Loughborough, whose father had also followed the trade of carpenter (and builder) in the town. The first Edward Savage married by licence Elizabeth Wyatt, widow of the town, in 1737, when he was aged 21.⁹ Elizabeth died shortly afterwards and in 1741 the widower espoused, again by licence, Mary Eggington, a local spinster.¹⁰ The second Edward was issue of this marriage in September 1744.¹¹ Some confusion arises as another Edward, carpenter, contracted a marriage with Mary Arnold in 1759, when this Edward was purportedly aged 35.¹² There is a receipted bill for work by the elder Edward for building in the Rushes and enclosures in the town about the time of the Enclosure proceedings in 1760-3.¹³ On a firmer basis, the eldest Edward Savage composed his will in 1779, which was proved in 1780 (No. 70). The will reveals that he owned the George Inn which he leased to William Wells and that he had also erected four messuages in Baxtergate. His executors insured his property with the Sun Fire Office (No. 89). The

Edwards Savage had thus been closely involved in the construction of new housing the the town in the middle and late eighteenth century. Indeed, one of the trustees of the elder Edward was Robert Bonser, brickmaker in the town, and probably a collaborator in new building.

Descriptions of buildings have also been extracted from probate material both in The National Archives and in the Record Office for Leicestershire, Leicester and Rutland. A large proportion of the wills concern only personal estate with cash legacies. Some others which do mention real estate contain a very general reference to all real and personal estate with no further description of the property. A small proportion elucidate the nature of the buildings, their location by street, and the occupants, and, as importantly, the nature of the tenure or estate: whether free tenure or leasehold, and the terms of the lease. Less felicitously, it has been impossible to find probate inventories which itemise rooms corresponding to the buildings in the wills.

THE EIGHTEENTH-CENTURY TOWN: BRIEF HISTORIOGRAPHY

There is a sense in which there is always a civic culture in which urban populations participate to one extent or another, whether an elite or at certain times wider involvement.¹⁴ As a consequence, some selective civic buildings were constructed to signify this civic culture.¹⁵ A more extensive redesign of urban space was identified by Peter Borsay which was incipient in the Restoration period and developed in the eighteenth century.¹⁶ In this scenario the extent of 'polite' urban reorganization varied according to the size of urban places. A similar proposition had been advanced by Alan Everitt for county boroughs in particular as they became centres of administration, distribution and leisure for their surrounding county or in some places very localized regions ('countries') in the eighteenth century.¹⁷ Improvements in the urban infrastructure through lighting and paving have been elucidated by Penny Corfield.¹⁸ The private regulation of space, particularly through long or 'building' leases, was analyzed in detail by Christopher Chalklin for sample urban places: Bath, Birmingham, Manchester, Liverpool, Nottingham, Portsea and Hull.¹⁹ Further examinations of selected non-industrial urban places were collected together: Winchester (a cathedral city dissected by Adrienne Rosen); and Bath (a much-explored spa town with a distinctive polite society, reconsidered by Sylvia McIntyre).²⁰ This 'transformation of English provincial towns' was addressed in a compendium of essays which covered all aspects of their transition, but with particular reference to the eighteenth century by Borsay (on ritual and ceremony) and urban retailing (Ian Mitchell).²¹

The long eighteenth century has thus been identified as a time of transition in urban places, in the reformulation of space, the environment, and people inhabiting and operating in that urban space. Loughborough belonged to the lowest level or category of even small towns: unincorporated; with a much smaller population (still fewer than five thousand in 1801); within a large parish; but industrializing from the end of the seventeenth century. According to Fletcher, who compiled a brief history of Loughborough, the ‘gentleman’ Pochin, referring to the buildings in the town, opined in 1770:

They are in general but very indifferent; the best comparatively speaking so; however, not the least tincture of elegance graces any one single building in this place.²²

This observation was made by Dr Pochin in his manuscript history of Loughborough. Thomas Pochin, MD, (died 1781), had resided in Loughborough. The manuscript came into the hands of the Reverend Mr Woodcock who loaned it to Throsby who recited the critical comment by Pochin on the architecture of the town. Throsby was less condemnatory:

For my own part, I think that the buildings are far from indifferent; they correspond strictly with my idea of a trading town, and an industrious people.²³

Despite meetings of the local gentry for cock fights and a wider appreciation of horse racing on the meadow until 1756, the town did not apparently achieve much distinction through its architecture. Socio-political development in the town through the associational activity of the principal inhabitants has been explained by Clark.²⁴

CONVENTIONS

The transcriptions below are intended to be faithful to the original layout in the documents wherever possible. In some cases, the indentations (as in the byelaws) have been elided, but the general layout followed.

All forenames are extended from their contractions in the documents.
